W: Well Steve, we just want to help people get fit and become healthier. That's why at *Running in the Park* we started organizing family-friendly running events every weekend, on Sundays. We encourage members and their families and friends to join us for at least one run every month. In fact, many of our members come out and run at least two times a month. We've found that some who join our *Running in the Park* events also jog a couple of times a week in addition to running on the weekend.

Listening 11

Tom: Today we have with us Angela Lee, a spokesperson for an exciting project to bring internet access to the rest of the world. Angela, welcome to the program.

Angela: Thanks. Tom. It's great to be here. As you know, most of us take internet access for granted, but in fact, for every person who has internet access there are two people who don't. In some regions of the world, nobody has internet access.

Tom: So tell our audience what your company does to solve this?

Angela: Well we've developed large balloons which go up very high into the atmosphere and transmit data signals back down to earth. Signals from one balloon can cover about 3,000 square kilometers on the ground.

Tom: But won't the balloons just blow away in the wind? I mean, how do you control them?

Angela: At first, we thought that might be a problem. But then we realized that since winds blow in different directions depending on how high they are, we could control them by changing how high they are above the Earth. If the wind is blowing the balloon west, we can raise or lower the balloon to where there is a wind blowing east. In this way, we can keep the balloons in the same region.

Tom: I see. How long do they last? I can imagine they are easily damaged by storms.

Angela:

The balloons fly about 20,000 meters above the Earth, so they aren't affected by bad weather. They also fly high enough not to bother airplanes. One issue that we have, however, is that the balloons are affected by extreme changes in temperature, and they begin to lose gas and start to fall back to earth. At first, we could keep them up for three months, but now they last about six months before they need to be replaced. In the future we hope to keep them up for at least a full year.

Tom:

So when and where will the project start?

Angela:

Actually, we've already started. We've been running the program for several months in Kenya where most people living outside the major cities don't have internet access. But even before that, we had successfully provided internet access to parts of Peru that were affected by heavy flooding. After that, our biggest operation was in Puerto Rico after Hurricane Maria hit the territory. The whole island was without power, so we launched balloons from Nevada in the United States to fly over the island to provide free internet service.

Tom:

Well, this is an exciting project and I wish you and your team the best of luck.

W: Hey Peter, I heard you needed some help.

M: Sarah! Thanks for coming. I just want to print these documents, but I can't connect to the printer. I need to have them ready for a meeting at three.

W: When did you last print something?

M: It was working fine this morning when I printed a letter, but after lunch it wasn't working.

W: That's odd. Did you install any printer updates recently?

M: No. I've printed stuff all week without any trouble. Even some colour photographs, which sometimes can cause a problem.

M: Yeah, I checked that first. I also put in new ink cartridges on Friday after I printed the handouts for a presentation, so that can't be the problem.

W: The printer is turned off.
