Listening 11

W: Oh, that's so cute! Is it a lizard?

M: Kind of. It's a Leopard Gecko. Her name is Alisha.

W: Is she easy to keep?

M: Yes, that's why we got her. Leopard Geckos make good pets for children. They don't need to be exercised. They're also pretty clean, so the kids only need to clean the tank a couple of times a week.

W: Don't lizards need to be kept in a hot place?

M: Not really, but we have to be a little bit careful controlling their temperature. It's essential, however, to make sure they have lots of moisture in their tank. They need a humid environment.

W: What do you feed her?

M: She really loves live insects. Crickets are her main diet. And sometimes we give her special pellets which are a special food containing lots of vitamins and minerals. Or some bits of potato. But Alisha's favourite snack is a juicy worm.

W: Oh! Does she eat worms every day?

M: No, only occasionally.

W: Well, she is cute, but I don't really like the insects.

When was the last time you ate cheese? It's one of the most widely eaten foods in the world. For example, the average American eats about 15 kilograms a year – or over a kilogram a month. But that's not as much as the French people, who on average eat over 26 kilograms a year and the Swiss, who consume about 22 kilograms each. Surprisingly, people in Britain, the home of the popular cheddar cheese, do not eat much cheese, only about 10 kilograms per person per year.

Consumption is still low in Japan where cheese is not part of the traditional diet. In fact the average person here eats only about 2.3 kilograms a year, which is about how much the average French person eats in just one month. But Japanese people do seem to like cheese and are eating more of it each year.

You might be surprised to know that cows and milk were probably first introduced into Japan in the seventh century. At that time, just very simple types of cheese were made, and were only consumed by the Emperor and wealthy people. But the consumption of cheese had stopped entirely before the tenth century, as the popularity of cheese had decreased during the eighth and ninth centuries under the influence of Buddhism.

In the late nineteenth century, the Meiji government wanted to make Japanese people stronger. In particular, it wanted to create a tougher military, so the government looked at what the most powerful countries in Europe were doing. Soldiers in those countries were eating cheese and meat and drinking milk, but Japanese soldiers were not. The Japanese government decided to introduce cheese and meat into Japan, believing that would help their troops become stronger. However, at that time Japan didn't have the money to buy cheese and meat from other countries, so the government decided to produce its own. However, there were no dairy farms, so in the mid-1870s

the government established several in Hokkaido to produce cheese and milk. Some of the original dairy farms are still working today, but their many workers are now producing cheese which is exported to America, and even to Europe.

Listening 13

You will hear a tour guide giving some information to listeners. Look at the six sentences below. Decide if each sentence is **TRUE** or **FALSE**. If it is **TRUE**, choose (A). If it is **FALSE**, choose (B).

Welcome to your library orientation tour. We hope that this tour will help you be able to use the facilities more efficiently and comfortably. Please feel free to interrupt me with questions at any time.

First of all, you will need your student ID card every time you enter the library, so please take your cards out and I'll show you how to use them. Notice the bar code on your card? Place that face down over the scanner and hold it there until the gate opens for you, just like this. You won't need your card again to get out, but you do need it to check out any materials.

Okay, now you can see that you are in front of two desks. On the left here is the circulation desk, which is where you can check out and return books. Just present your ID card and the books to the librarian. This desk over to the right is for when you need a little bit of extra help or information. Just ask the assistants and they'll do what they can to help you.

However, before you ask the assistants, try to find what you need on your own using the computers over there. You can do a search for author, title, or other key words to help you find what you are looking for. I'll demonstrate how to do that at the end of the tour. You can also browse the shelves for books arranged by subject. You can see maps on the wall noting where different subject areas are located in the library.

Since all of you will be reading books for your English classes, let me show you where those are located and explain a little bit about how they are arranged by difficulty level. Please follow me.
