### Listening 11

M:      Good morning, and welcome to your favorite weekly food show. The story of wine production in Japan is a surprising and fascinating one. This morning we are speaking to Kate Tegan, an expert on Japan's wine culture. Good morning, Kate, and welcome to the show.

W:      It's a pleasure to be here, Mark.

M:      Could you tell us a bit about the history of growing grapes in Japan?

W:      Sure. Japan actually has a long history of growing grapes, going back hundreds of years. But these grapes couldn't be made into wine. They were consumed as fresh fruit, what we would call table grapes. Then, in the late-nineteenth century, the Japanese government decided to develop a local wine industry, so it imported varieties of wine grapes from Europe and America and distributed them to farmers. The first Japanese winemakers tried to grow these imported wine grapes, but, unfortunately, they weren't suited to Japan's soil and humid climate. So they developed new hybrid varieties of wine grapes, and now these are the ones mostly grown for making wine in Japan.

M:      And is this when wine started to become popular in Japan?

W:      No, not at all. As you know, a traditional Japanese diet is based on rice. The taste of rice and wine don't really go together very well. It wasn't really until the Tokyo Olympics in 1964 that Japanese people started to drink wine, as their taste for food became more westernized. As a result, people in Japan started buying wine, but only European and American wines were in demand. Since then there have been three wine booms in Japan. The first was in 1980 when French Beaujolais Nouveau was introduced here. The second one was in 1997 when wines from Chile and Argentina flooded the Japanese market. The third started in 2014 and it's still going on as we speak. What's different this time around, however, is that Japanese winemakers have been able to take advantage



- of it. As a result, the market for Japanese wine has grown considerably not only domestically, but also internationally.
- M: Okay, Kate, so what wine regions should I be interested in if I want to try Japanese wine?
- W: Well, Mark, wine is produced in every prefecture in Japan, but Yamanashi prefecture is currently the largest wine-producing region. There's also Yamagata prefecture...Hokkaido, which despite its cold climate makes a lot of wine, and Nagano, which is right behind Yamanashi in wine production, produces some of the best wine in Japan.
- M: I'm curious. Are there many small, independent winemakers in Japan or are they run by large corporations?
- W: It's a bit complex. In Japan there are over 200 places where wine is produced. These are known as wineries. Nearly all of them are owned by large beverage companies like Kirin or Suntory and most were established over a hundred years ago. They are actually fairly small in size and employ about 300 or so people. There are also newer wineries that are even smaller. These are independent wineries and are typically run by husband-and-wife teams. Many of them are young and have either studied or worked at wineries overseas. The knowledge these young winemakers have gained is much more advanced than the independent winemakers a generation ago, and it's really helped the Japanese wine industry as a whole. Because of their training and background, these people have the necessary knowledge to experiment compared to their larger competitors. For example, by mixing together different types of grapes, they've been able to create some really exciting and award-winning wines.
- M: Very interesting. We're going to a short break and when we come back, Kate will introduce some of her favorite Japanese wines.

You will hear a woman called Julie talking to a man called Michael about a basketball game. Look at the 6 sentences below. Decide if each sentence is **TRUE** or **FALSE**. If it is **TRUE**, choose (A). If it is **FALSE**, choose (B).

- Michael: Hi Julie! Great basketball game last night, wasn't it? Did you go?
- Julie: Yeah, but I almost didn't make it. I didn't have a ticket until my brother's friend let me have his because he couldn't go to the game. It was great, Michael. I had a seat not far from the front of the court, just behind the players.
- Michael: That explains why I didn't see you. I was sitting in my usual place near the back of the arena and couldn't see the people sitting by the front of the court.
- Julie: It was great to see the action up close for a change. What a win!
- Michael: I didn't think that the Dolphins could do it. But I was wrong. Let's face it, the other team, the Rockets, are last year's champions, so I don't think many people thought we could win.
- Julie: True. But we did. It was close though. I only began to feel confident that the Dolphins could win when we were five points ahead in the final minute of the game. But I got really nervous when we missed a basket and then the Rockets scored three points with fifteen seconds left on the clock.
- Michael: Yeah. That was close. I can't wait for next week's game. Are you going?
- Julie: Against the Tornados? That's one game I don't want to miss! I got a ticket as soon as they went on sale.

### **Listening 13**

You will hear a radio report on the topic of plant-based burgers. Look at the 6 sentences below. Decide if each sentence is **TRUE** or **FALSE**. If it is **TRUE**, choose (A). If it is **FALSE**, choose (B).

The next time you stop in at a fast food restaurant, you might be in for a surprise at what's on the menu. You can now eat a burger that contains absolutely no meat at all. Carl Jr's, a major American burger chain, announced it is offering a plant-based burger at more than 1,000 locations. America's second largest burger chain, Burger King, has also announced it would be offering a plant-based burger at 180 locations, with another 2,400 locations in Europe. Carl Jr's burgers are produced by the company Beyond Meat while Burger King's burgers are made in collaboration with Beyond Meat's rival called Impossible Foods. Both make a burger that looks and tastes like meat but which isn't meat at all. This new trend in plant-based burgers isn't just limited to fast food. And while only 8% of the US population is vegetarian, many restaurants are reporting shortages of these plant-based alternatives due to high demand. All of this is making meat companies nervous. The meat companies don't object to the plant-based products being sold, but they want laws that ban the use of the words "meat" or "burger" on the label. Despite opposition from the meat industry, Burger King's plant-based burgers have caused the company's sales to jump by 5%, one of the largest increases in Burger King's history.
