- M: Where are you going, Mika?
- W: I'm going to walk to the post office to mail a package.
- M: Okay, do you want me to come with you? I can carry the package.
- W: Thanks.
- M: What are you mailing? It's not that heavy.
- W: Oh, I'm selling some of my clothes.
- M: I saw you had a stack of clothes on the bed the other day.
- W: Right. I've been going through my clothes to find things to throw away. You know, clothes I got as gifts that I never wear. And I don't know why, but my mother also dropped off some of her old clothes.
- M: I noticed that. Those things won't fit you, will they?
- W: No, and they're stained or damaged in some way. No one is going to want them.
 But some of the clothes I bought a long time ago are still nice. I just don't feel like wearing them anymore, so I decided to sell them online. Today I'm sending a skirt and blouse to someone in China.
- 49. What kind of clothes did the woman sell online?

- M: Hey, Angela. I'm going down to the coffee shop to grab a large coffee and a donut. Want anything?
- W: That's kind of you, Tom. I'd like a blueberry muffin and a small coffee please.
- M: If you want a muffin, I brought some banana ones this morning that you can have.
- W: Oh, I'll take a banana muffin. Thanks. And on second thought could you just get me a large coffee, instead? I might need the extra caffeine to study this afternoon.
- M: Sure thing. I'll be back in a few minutes.
- 50. What will the man order for the woman at the coffee shop?

- M: Good morning. This is the Ambassador Hotel. How may I help you?
- W: Hello. My name is Sue Bradford. I'd like to reserve a room for two this Saturday please.
- M: Certainly, ma'am. Our standard rooms are \$125. Our deluxe rooms are \$175.Which would you prefer?
- W: Do both rooms have a view of the ocean?
- M: Just the deluxe rooms do.
- W: Is breakfast included?
- M: No. That will be \$30 extra for two guests. The total would then be \$155 and \$205 for the standard and deluxe rooms, respectively.
- W: Okay. I'll take an ocean view room with the breakfast option please.

- W: Okay. What if we wait a few days and then see the first show on Thursday?
- M: Actually, I'm kind of busy all day, Thursday. The last show would be better for me.

- M: Welcome to the orientation, everyone. We'd like to start with an important announcement about next week's health check. Part B Listening 7~8 では、英語を聞いて、印刷された問題に対する最も 適切な答えを(A)~(C)のうちから一つ選びなさい。なお、Listening 7 に は問題が四つ、Listening 8 には問題が四つあります。例題はありませ ん。

- W: Hello everyone, and welcome to the "Thrill Seekers" podcast. Today, we have a very special guest, Kirk James, who has possibly the most interesting job I can think of—he's a roller-coaster designer. Kirk, thanks for joining us today.
- M: Thank you for having me. It's a pleasure to be here.
- W: To start off, could you tell us a little bit about how you became a roller-coaster designer?
- M: Sure. I've always been fascinated by roller coasters and theme park attractions. It might have something to do with living near the Super World amusement park as a kid.
- W: The theme park near Seattle?
- M: That's the one. I used to go there maybe four or five times a year with my brother Alex and my dad as far back as elementary school. I even made small models of the rides I designed. That was my dream job back then, and by the time I was in high school, that hadn't changed. I knew I wanted to design and build things, so I studied engineering at university. I worked in the robotics industry for a few years before I got my dream job designing roller coasters. And 15 years later I'm still there!
- W: That's really interesting. So, how long does it take you to design a new roller coaster, from start to finish?
- M: It really depends on the complexity of the roller coaster and what the client needs. Most roller coasters I work on take twelve months to design. A basic roller coaster, nothing fancy, takes less, anywhere from six to eight months, but more complex ones can take well over a year from start to finish. Theme parks always want something new, something different that hasn't been done before, and the more

complex, the harder it is. Everything is a balance of physics, safety, and fun.

- W: Now, you've been doing this for a long time and know a lot about roller coasters, so which one is your favourite?
- M: That's a tough question. I mean the Astro Jump at Super World is still special for me because that's the one I rode and loved the most as a kid. But of the ones I've designed...I'd probably say the "Sky Scraper" at White Mountain Park in Colorado. It's a roller coaster that takes riders up over 50 metres in the air. It's the tallest one I've designed, and to me the most fun to ride. The one recently I'm most proud of designing though is the "Back Breaker" at Cedar Hills Park in Texas. It was the most challenging roller coaster I've ever designed.
- W: Oh, gosh. You know, I tried that one for the first time when I was in Texas only a few weeks ago, and I can tell you I was smiling so much at the end. So Kirk, do you try the rides yourself once they are finished?
- M: Absolutely! I mean, you can't work on something for a couple of years without wanting to try it once it's finished. And you know, as a roller-coaster designer, it's important for me to understand the experience from the rider's perspective. It's not enough to just see their reaction after the ride is over. Plus, it gives me ideas for the next roller coaster I design. I try out roller coasters that other people have designed, too, for the same reason. Theme parks always demand something new that's never been done before but for me, above all, it has to be fun. That's my thought process when designing a ride.
- W: I totally agree and having ridden a couple of your rides, I can say you've succeeded. Lovely talking to you today, Kirk. Thanks for coming in to chat.
- M: It was my pleasure, thank you.

- M: Welcome to our program. Today we have with us Masako Furusawa, the owner of a company called Furusawa Distillery in Miyazaki. Masako's company makes Japanese alcohol called *shochu*. Her company is quite special in that it continues to make *shochu* in a traditional way. She is here to talk about that, and how climate change may make that impossible in the near future. Masako, welcome to our program.
- W: Thank you. It's a pleasure to be here.
- M: So your company has been around for over 100 years. And has been using the same buildings and methods during that time, right? Why do you think it's important to keep using traditional techniques?
- W: Traditions are important despite the cost of maintaining them. Using what's available locally, something made by local people in the local climate, that's the ideal for *shochu*. It might take longer to do it this way, but it's what gives our *shochu* its unique flavor.
- M: With climate change, do you think you'll still be able make *shochu* in Miyazaki in the traditional way?
- W: Well, if the weather gets warmer, that's definitely a concern. This year was really hot and we had to adjust the way we do things. If the weather gets any hotter though, it's going to be a problem. We'll still be able to make *shochu* here, but we won't be able to do it traditionally any more. Like other companies have already done, we will have to install coolers or other climate control devices.
- M: I see. Now I hope that you won't be offended by this, but isn't it a bit unusual for a woman to be the head of a *shochu* company? Aren't they normally run by men?
- W: Well, yes, many of them *are* run by men but there are a lot of female owners, too. More than you might think. But to have a woman who is both owner and the person in charge of actually making the *shochu* is quite unusual. But in our case, my grandmother took over both roles after my grandfather died. After my grandmother retired, her daughter, my mother, then took over the company and became the next head. When she got married, my father became the fourth head and now I'm the fifth. So for me, it was perfectly natural that women would be involved in *shochu* making. I have a daughter, and I'm sure she'll take over from

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me one day.

- M: Have you noticed any other changes that are affecting the industry?
- W: Sure. Part of it is just the changing generations of owners as people retire and younger people take over. Also, people's eating habits have changed. Nowadays it's quite normal to have Western food at home, which doesn't really go well with *shochu*. Also, the relationships between the *shochu* makers are closer than in my grandmother's time. They're working together to do more for *shochu* and broaden its appeal, not only in Japan but overseas as well. In the old days, there was a lot of competition among *shochu* makers because their customers were all local. *Shochu* makers still mainly market their products locally, but nowadays, there are shipping services that can deliver *shochu* anywhere in the world.
- M: Yes, I'd heard that *shochu* has become more popular in other countries. Thank you so much for coming in and spending time with us today. It's been a real pleasure.

Listening 9

You will hear a man talking to a woman about their university classes. Look at the 8 statements below. Decide if each statement is **TRUE** or **FALSE**. If it is **TRUE**, choose (A). If it is **FALSE**, choose (B). You now have 20 seconds to preview the questions.

Listening 9 will now begin.

- M: How's it going, Keiko? Are your university classes going okay?
- W: Not too bad. I studied German as a foreign language in my first year, but it was just too difficult for me, so I'm going to try something else this year. I just can't decide what to take.
- M: I know what you mean. I tried German too when I was a freshman but had to give it up for the same reason. Then I gave French a try. The grammar was easier, but the pronunciation was harder.
- W: Are you still taking French?
- M: No, I took just one class and got one credit for it, but we need to get eight credits of foreign languages in my department. Four credits have to be in English and the other four have to be in another foreign language. So we could get four credits in French, or four credits in Spanish, or whatever other language we want. So this year, I'm going to try Spanish instead. The grammar and pronunciation are supposed to be easier.

- W: Maybe I should do that, too. I don't need as many credits in a foreign language in my department. We only need four credits in any foreign language. Do you know when Spanish class meets?
- M: Yeah, you have two choices, either Tuesday after lunch in third period, which is what I'm going to do, or Thursday mornings in second period. Why don't you take the class with me, and we could learn together.
- W: I would if I could but I work part-time on Tuesdays evenings, so I don't know if I can do that.
- M: Third period ends at 3:15, so you should still have enough time to get to work, right?
- W: Yeah. You're probably right. It only takes an hour to get to work and it starts from 5:00. That just doesn't leave me much time for anything else that day. I'm busy working on weekends, too.
- M: Why are you working so hard?
- W: I'm going to driving school this summer and need the money.
- M: Good luck with that. So...about Spanish class...how about taking the class with me? I mean we haven't taken class together since high school.
- W: Yeah, okay. I'll register for it right now. It'll be great to be in the same class with you again.

You will hear a news report about a man named Eric, who is working in Rwanda. Look at the 6 statements below. Decide if each statement is **TRUE** or **FALSE**. If it is **TRUE**, choose (A). If it is **FALSE**, choose (B). You now have 20 seconds to preview the questions.

Listening 10 will now begin.

W: For years, Eric Habimana's father caught fish to pay for his son's school fees. The problem, however, was that Eric's father was catching the fish illegally. He struggled to make a living as a farmer, so, like many people in the area, caught fish from the lakes of Akagera National Park to feed his family. When the government made strong efforts in 2010 to stop this illegal fishing in the national park, he and others had to move on to nearby Lake Gishanda, just outside the park boundaries, instead. Eventually, there were no fish left in Lake Gishanda to either eat or sell.

Now Eric is on a mission to reverse the damage. He manages Gishanda Fish Farm, which is based on the banks of the lake to cultivate fish and restock the waters. In April, 2022, the first young fish raised in the farm were released into the water. More than 100,000 have been released so far and the ambition is to produce 1.5 million fish each year.

With joint funding and support from a local conservation organization, Rwandan companies and universities and an overseas government, the farm opened in October, 2021. The aim is to produce about 30 tons of fish annually, of which at least 10% will be sold at half the market price to the 600 households who live around the lake. It is hoped the move will not only stop illegal fishing but also improve nutrition for the villagers.

The farm also provides jobs and job training to breed catfish and grow organic vegetables. Eventually, Eric would like the villagers living around the lake to manage the farm, and they are working with district officials to identify other suitable lakes in the area that could be restocked with fish.

M: This is the end of the listening test.
