Listening 1

Good morning, Texas. Here's your weather forecast for today. For those of us in East Texas, especially in the Houston area, we have a hot, wet day ahead of us. Expect a high of 36 degrees in the early afternoon, though it'll cool off a bit by the early evening with some rain. That same rain will pass through Central Texas, including the Austin and Dallas areas, earlier in the day. This means you'll get a little break from the heat, with a high of 32 degrees. West Texas will be much drier today, but you'll be reaching a high of 40 degrees. And hold on to your cowboy hats, because you'll be getting a lot of wind over the next few days! Lastly, those of you in South Texas will really need your air conditioners. Be ready for temperatures this afternoon topping out at 42 degrees. You may want start your barbecue after sundown. Question 49. Which area will be windy?

Listening 2

- W: Hey, Yuki. This is Maya.
- M: Hi, Maya. What's up?
- W: I just got back home from the graduation party and realized that I've lost the flowers my mum gave me. You don't happen to have them, do you?
- M: No, I don't. I remember they looked nice when you had them at school for the graduation ceremony though.
- W: Right. I had so many things to carry, but I remember taking them with me afterwards, so they can't be there.
- M: Did you leave them on the subway when we went to the graduation party at the hotel? That's the last time I saw you holding them.

- W: No, I definitely still had them at the hotel as I remember giving them to Nami when I went to the bathroom.
- M: Oh, that's right. You know, later on, a lot of us put our flowers and bags in the coat room before we walked across the street to the coffee shop for dessert afterward. Didn't you do that as well?
- W: Oh, that's right. Now I remember! I must have left them there after the party. I'll go back right now and see if I can find them. Thanks for the help!
- M: No problem.

Listening 3

- W: Right... why did you say "was" excited about?
- M: The game suddenly got cancelled again because the field wasn't available for some reason. So my manager had to choose either Thursday night or Saturday morning.
- W: So what happened?
- M: Well, he was only able to reserve the field for Saturday morning at 11 am which is fine, but I really wanted to experience a night game!

Listening 4

- M: That's nice you still got to meet your friend.
- W: Yeah, she's very understanding about things.

- M: No, we had curry for dinner last night, remember? I guess it'll be OK to order something and eat at home then. Let's just do that.
- W: Sure! I'll go find that coupon.

Part B Listening 7~8 では、英語を聞いて、印刷された問題に対する最も適切 な答えを(A)~(D)うちから一つ選びなさい。なお、Listening 7 には問題が 二つ、Listening 8 には問題が四つあります。例題はありません。

Listening 7

- W: Dennis! Have you heard about Walter?
- M: Hey, Minnie! No, what's happened?
- W: Apparently he was playing football and he broke his ankle. He's in the hospital now.
- M: How awful! How long will he be there?
- W: At least a week.
- M: Ah dear. He must be getting bored. Can we go and visit him?
- W: We can! His mum told me the hospital rules are quite strict, though.
- M: Can we go at any time, or are we limited to certain hours? That's how these things usually work, right?
- W: Right. Well, they have two sessions on weekdays, one in the morning until about ten, and one in the evening between seven and eight. Are you free Monday or Thursday?
- M: I'm really busy at the beginning of the week, but I can come later in the week. I'm at work until about four in the afternoon every day though. How about the weekend? Do they keep the same hours?
- W: They do on Saturday, but I'll be away then. I could do Sunday. Let me check the text from his mum again... Oh, looks like they are closed to visitors then because they don't have enough staff. Better to do the weekday.
- M: OK, I'll come and pick you up and we can go together. We should probably bring him something, too. Fruit maybe? That's always a popular choice. Healthy, too!
- W: The nurses are giving him plenty to eat, so he doesn't need any more. Besides, you know Walter! He's far more likely to want chocolate if anything.
- M: Ah yes, he does have a sweet tooth, but the hospital won't allow it. Hmmm... If he's bored, maybe he'd like something to read, like sports magazines? Or how about some flowers to brighten up the room?
- W: They make him sneeze. But I like your other idea. I'll pick something up.

Listening 8

- W: Welcome everyone to *My Life in 60 Minutes*. Today, I'm delighted to have Mr. Patrick Thomas, the well-known novelist and world-traveler, as my special guest on Radio Crackle. Thank you for coming today, Patrick.
- M: Thank you, Kirsty. It's a pleasure.
- W: Before I ask you any questions, I'd like to give the listeners a brief summary of your life and achievements so far. Born in London in 1964, you are one of six children two boys and four girls. At the age of fifteen you published your first novel and by the age of twenty you had sold over twelve million books. However, by the time you were thirty, you had decided to give up writing novels and explore the world.
- M: Yes! As you know, my grandfather was a very successful writer himself and I think ultimately he inspired me to take up the profession. Before that though, my mother bought us kids so many books, and my father took us to the library regularly. However, my older sister read to us almost every day which is what really sparked my love of literature.
- W: So there were always books around your family... it makes sense that you would become a novelist. Can you tell us a little more about your grandfather?
- M: Of course. He was always reading something, a book, a newspaper, a magazine even a dictionary. His most famous book, of course is *Where the Leaves Have Fallen*.
- W: Yes, I think many of us have read that. I must admit I love his follow-up *Let the Leaves Grow...* Let's move on to your first novel *Touching the Clouds*. How did you come up with that title?
- M: It was something one of my teachers at school said. His name was Mr. White, and he loved planes. He said his dream was to fly a plane and "touch the clouds" and he always encouraged his students to try and 'touch their dreams' rather than settle for second best. His words inspired me to write my second novel *Once You Reach the Summit.* I think writing this novel started to get me thinking about seeing more of the world than my parents had.
- W: So at this stage you decided to put down your pencil and change careers?
- M: Yes, that's right.
- W: And that led you to start making TV shows. Tell us about the first one.
- M: Well, I was in Madagascar when I met a TV producer who had read one of my books. We had a couple of mutual friends in Morocco, and he suggested making a show there. In the end those plans fell through, but when I returned to the UK I contacted the producer and we made it there.
- W: And in your latest show you're off to Bulgaria?
- M: That's right. It's called *Patrick Thomas: Back in Bulgaria*, and you can watch it at 9 o'clock this evening on BBC One.

- W: Thanks! The guy I usually go to has moved to another city to study, but his replacement did a great job!
- M: Does he cut men's hair, too? I've been going to a really cheap place for a while, but you know... you get what you pay for. I'd like to treat myself to a really good haircut for a change.
- W: I don't think I've ever seen a male customer in there, but they do have a price list on the wall for men's cuts. It's kind of pricey!
- M: I don't mind if it's good. Is it easy to make an appointment?
- W: It depends on when you go. I do have an appointment this weekend, but midweek is usually easier. They're open until quite late, too, so you can drop by after work. It's on your way home.
- M: I've got a lot going on at the moment. I'm not sure I'll be able to get there before they close. I'll call them and take a chance on the weekend. Maybe I'll get lucky and someone will have cancelled.
- W: That happens sometimes. If you have nothing better to do you can go in early on Saturday and wait around until one of the hairdressers has a free moment. There are usually a few walk-ins, and even if you have to hang around for an hour or two you'll get your hair cut eventually. There's a coffee shop next door that serves great lattes.
- M: Waiting around is not really my idea of a fun Saturday. I'll book an appointment for a weekday instead. What's the name of the guy who usually does your hair?
- W: Mauro. He'll do yours if he's available, but I think he prefers to cut women's hair. As far as I know Patrice is the best for men's hair. I have a card for the salon. The number is on there. Shall I give him a call later?
- M: No, it's OK. I'll give him a call right now.

Listening 10

Decide if each sentence is **TRUE** or **FALSE** If it is **TRUE**, choose (A). If it is **FALSE**, choose (B). You now have 20 seconds to preview the questions.

- M: So, Naomi, what was Laura's favorite food when you two were growing up?
- W: D'you mean like a dish or dessert?
- M: More like a dish. I want to cook up a special dinner for our anniversary.
- W: Ooh, she's gonna love that. Let me think. Laura used to love it when Mom made us lasagna for dinner.
- M: Lasagna?
- W: Yeah. She especially liked when Mom would put in green olives.
- M: Olives? Most kids don't like olives.
- W: Well, you know, Laura's always been a bit unique.
- M: True. Was there anything else special about it?
- W: Well, Mom also used tofu instead of cottage cheese.
- M: What? You're kidding.
- W: Not at all. It works really nicely.
- M: Sounds a little strange but I can try it. I've always liked putting in broccoli, too.
- W: What, really? Doesn't Laura hate broccoli?
- M: She's never said anything to me about it, and she made us a delicious broccoli soup for dinner a few weeks ago, so...
- W: Well, I guess her tastes have changed as she's gotten older.
